Much activity at the UCLH Cancer Centre site

Anyone working or living near the former UCLH Elizabeth Garrett Anderson (Maternity) Hospital will be aware of the major building work taking place. As this photo shows the foundations are soon to be laid and a reduced level dig is taking place to construct the pile wall capping beams. The construction of a temporary loading gantry along Huntley Street (opposite the UCL Cancer Institute) will be operational imminently. The piling around the site perimeter has commenced and a second stage of digging to a reduced level in order to form the basement slab has commenced.

All this is very exciting for the new UCLH Cancer Centre and the contractors SKANSKA have said they are well on target and even slightly ahead of the timetable for completion of the building by late 2011! The site has received a visit by the Considerate Constructor Inspector resulting in a score of 35/40 - which is extremely good.

The fundraising is gaining momentum and hopefully more and more friends of UCLH will make donations. The Charitable Foundation are happy to meet people and patients to share how they might help in many different ways. This newsletter brings information

regarding fundraising events and news. Congratulations in particular to those Cancer Consultants who are recommending their patients to assist in the fundraising. Contact is being made to Trusts and Foundations, Corporations, and philanthropists to give support.

Major Donation received for UCLH Cancer Centre

Early in March a substantial donation of £750,000 was received from the Trustees of the Kay Kendall Leukaemia Fund. This is very important to the fundraising campaign and will be an encouragement for others who are considering making a grant.

Kay Kendall was a well regarded actress and died at the young age of just 33. She was married to Rex Harrison who cared for her throughout her illness with Leukaemia. She will be remembered especially for her starring role in the film Genevieve. In 1984 under the will of the late James Sainsbury the Kay Kendall Leukaemia Fund was established.

The UCLH Charitable Foundation are very grateful for this tremendous gift.

Update on the Fetal Medicine Unit

The Fetal Medicine Unit (FMU) has a team of highly skilled consultants and midwives offering specialist care for pregnant women and their families when there is a concern about the health of an unborn baby. UCLH Charitable Foundation has recently funded the purchase of a new fetal scanning machine which aids diagnosis and treatment of conditions detected in the womb, allowing experts to identify a range of problems including Down's Syndrome, heart defects, Spina Bifida and growth problems.

Every day this new scanning machine enables staff to treat and support the families of 30 unborn babies, making a tangible difference to their lives.

We are looking to raise money to purchase these monitors, at a cost of £15,000 a piece. This technology does not come cheap, but every donation brings us one step closer to a better experience for families.

Dr Pran Pandya, Director of the Fetal Medicine Unit, says 'the aim of our unit is to reassure parents when there are no problems and in those circumstances where there may be a problem to help provide accurate information and to support the family through the pregnancy. Ultrasound technology is advancing at a rapid pace and new equipment ensures that we can provide the best diagnostic imaging available'.

Update on the Sarcoid/CFA Fund

Donations to the Sarcoid/CFA fund continue to be gratefully received by the team working in the Sarcoid Department at the hospital. Some of the current research, which has been ongoing over the past few years, involves using a combination of population and functional studies to develop transitional research tools that may ultimately provide valuable prognostic information and identify potential therapeutic targets in Sarcoidosis. In 2007 donations received by the Charitable Foundation for the Sarcoid/CFA Fund helped purchase a Nano Drop ND8000 UV-VIS Spectrophotometer which enables highly accurate analyses using tiny amounts of sample with remarkable reproducibility. Using this technology has significantly facilitated functional studies by reducing the number of cells needed for each experiment.

Last year, on Sunday 6th December, the rainiest morning of the year, hundreds of Santas descended into Greenwich Park. Grouped underneath the sparse protection of trees, huddled around umbrellas, or simply braving the elements and getting drenched, all of these people had one thing in common, they were all running 5k to support charity.

ULCH Charitable Foundation benefited from incredible support, with Fundraising Events Manager Hannah Persaud rounding up 19 people to take part.

A huge congratulations to all of those who braved the elements in the spirit of the festive season, and an extra special congratulations to Dr Matthew Hugget (Research Registrar), whose wife Jen gave birth to a baby girl later that very evening, four weeks early. Jen was responsible for recording race times on the day, but clearly her baby did not want to be left out of the running!

Update on the Young Person's Unit

The Young Person's Unit (YPU) cares for patients aged 13-19 with chronic and acute illnesses other than cancer (the Teenage Cancer Trust Unit shares a floor with the YPU). These illnesses include rheumatological, gastrointestinal and endocrine disorders, many of which are life-long and some of which can be life threatening. The YPU helps patients cope with their experiences.

Through UCLH Charitable Foundation the YPU was extremely fortunate to have benefited from 3 years of support from the law firm Taylor Wessing. This support included the funding of a multi-function room in the YPU which is used as a 'den' by most of the patients. This area is equipped with comfy sofas, a plasma screen and a DVD library, offering young patients a home from home. Taylor Wessing's support came to an end in early 2010 and we are now seeking new corporate support to help continue paying for equipment and resources for activities taking place at the YPU such as arts and crafts materials and books.

Update on the Cancer Clinical Trials Unit Fund

The UCLH Charitable Foundation is supporting research into Photo Dynamic Therapy (PDT) as a new, non-invasive treatment for pancreatic and bile duct cancers. PDT uses a low power laser combined with a light-sensitive drug (sometimes called a photosensitising agent) to destroy cancer cells. Depending on when a diagnosis is made, most patients with pancreatic or bile duct cancer usually live for just a matter of 6-9 months, even with palliative chemotherapy. Given the currently dismal survival rates for patients treated with the established regimes, a minimally invasive treatment capable of local destruction of tumour tissue - with low side effects - may have a place in the treatment of these diseases.

Over the last year, the UCLH Charitable Foundation has partfunded a second gastroenterology oncology research nurse within the Trust, to support the national phase III PHOTOSTENT-02 trial of photofrin PDT in locally advanced or metastatic biliary tree cancer, led by UCL/UCLH. Ongoing funding has also enabled a phase I pilot study of verteporfin PDT for patients with locally advanced pancreatic cancer to commence at UCLH in 2009, the first such trial of pancreatic PDT in the world. It is expected that further support will lead to a continued expansion of our portfolio of studies aimed at improving the survival and quality of life of patients with these deadly cancers.

Update on the Royal London Homoeopathic Hospital/CAMLIS

The Royal London Homceopathic Hospital has been a place of research and education in Homoeopathy since its foundation in 1849, and later on in other complementary therapies as well. But when the library collections of the Faculty of Homeopathy and the British Homeopathic Association were dispersed to various parts of the country, the hospital was left without a library service. A plan was made to start a new specialist library for Complementary and Alternative Medicine, and with the help of the UCLH Charitable Foundation the amount of £120,000 was raised to kick-start the project. Gerhard Bissels took up the post of librarian in April 2007, and developed a funding concept under which the Complementary and Alternative Medicine Library and Information Service (CAMLIS - www.cam.nhs.uk) is a joint venture between the RLHH, other healthcare providers, academic programmes and professional bodies in CAM in the UK and beyond. CAMLIS has since grown to a membership of 3,000, serves two universities and a fast-growing number of professional bodies, and has built up a substantial collection of both print and on-line resources.

Without the start-up funding which the UCLH Charitable Foundation and the League of Friends of the RLHH raised, CAMLIS would not have been possible. CAMLIS is open from Mon - Fri, 8.45 - 5.00 pm.

UPDATE ON THE NEONATAL UNIT

Donations received for the Neonatal Unit are vital in allowing the staff to maintain a high standard of care whilst using the best equipment possible. The donated funds go towards the purchase of state of the art incubators, research and equipment for the developmental care of babies on the Unit. The Neonatal Unit are extremely grateful for all the donations and support given to them.

UPDATE ON THE EARLY LUNG CANCER DETECTION AND TREATMENT PROGRAMME

We continue to support ground breaking research being led by Dr Jeremy George and his team in the Early Lung Cancer Treatment Programme.

The UCLH Early Lung Cancer Detection and Treatment Project set up by Dr Jeremy George has now been running for 8 years and has recruited over one hundred patients with lung abnormalities that are thought to lead to lung cancer. Lung Cancer is the biggest cancer killer in the world and little is known about its early development, or how to stop early lesions progressing to full blown cancer. This group of patients had been followed by Dr George in the hope that first and foremost he can detect lung cancer early in these patients. This has been a huge success with over 20 lung cancers being detected early enough for their successful treatment. These patients kindly donated samples taken from their lung (tiny biopsies) to laboratory based projects. Dr Sam Janes, another lung cancer physician at UCLH, has been recently recruited to examine these samples. One of the first projects he proposes is to examine why some of these early lung cancers progress to full blown cancer but others disappear. He believes looking at the differences between these samples will lead to clues in the design of new therapies to stop lung cancer progression. Dr Janes said ".....the samples generously donated by these patients are a unique resource in the world and they may answer many questions about the early development of lung cancer.....".

The Early Lung Cancer Detection Project is now seeking funds that can purchase the assays required to answer these important questions.
